2015 Highlights and Financial Statement

Through your partnership with Wings of the Eagle, you blessed and made a difference in the lives of many poor indigenous people in Mexico. In spite of many challenges that were faced during the year, your generous gifts made some wonderful things possible. Here are some highlights of 2015:

- Free nutritious meals were served to children and nursing mothers who come from the nearby agricultural labor camps on the outskirts of Ensenada. Over 4,200 individual meals were served during the year.
- Food staples (beans, rice, flour, oatmeal, eggs, vegetable oil, sugar, and powdered milk) were given out on a weekly basis to 38 families, and another 56 persons came from farther away for staples once or twice. In addition to food, dry detergent was also given to families in need.
- Drinking water—36,000 gallons of clean drinking water was purchased and given away to the poor families from the labor camps. Children and their mothers walk to Pastor Frank & Detra’s mission home to fill their empty containers and carry them home to their families. This is an especially critical need during the hot summer months.
- Medical care-- Free medical clinics were held for the poor, staffed by a Mexican physician. Prenatal exams for pregnant women were provided, and various illnesses were treated. Medications, immunizations and vitamins were provided free of charge to the clinic patients. Assistance with further medical care (patient taken for lab work, ultrasound, or to specialist or hospital) was provided when needed. Detra personally attended 43 births, 34 of which were teen mothers, 16 were home births.
- Advocacy before various government institutions (particularly Sector de Salud, hospital, and applying for birth certificates or Fed. ID) was provided by Pastor Frank. This is very time consuming, but very important to the indigenous people, many of whom do not speak Spanish and are mostly illiterate. Without someone who speaks Spanish and understands how the system works, they would not be able to get what they need at these government agencies.
- Remodeling of the medical clinic building was done, with the addition of a wheelchair ramp and other changes to make it handicap-accessible. The Mexican govt. requires medical clinics to conform to certain standards, which mandated the remodeling and changes at the clinic. Kitchen equipment was moved to the basement of the mission home, where meals are now served to the children.
- These outreaches provided many opportunities for Pastor Francisco and Detra to pray with, counsel and give Biblical teaching to dozens of individuals and families. Many experienced the love of God shown in very tangible ways, and some received the life-changing gospel of Christ.
